As of December 31, 2024, 94 adults and 21 children were experiencing homelessness in Fremont County.

A Year of Growth

This year marked the 40th anniversary for Loaves and Fishes Ministries. We started out by handing out food to our hungry neighbors from the back porch of a church. Over the years, our programs expanded and today over 6,500 individuals receive life changing and critical services annually.

What hasn't changed though, and still remains just as important today as it was in the beginning, is that everything we do is centered around building relationships with those we serve. We work hard to establish and nurture connections, prioritize open communication, listen to understand, show empathy and build trust.

God's timing is always perfect!

The new warehouse was completed in August, just in time for us to get ready for the Canon City School District Backpack Program. The Backpack Program provides nonperishable food to students over the weekends and school breaks. Food backpacks include healthy, easy-to-prepare food for kid-friendly meals. Weekly, volunteers pack 221 bags for schools to distribute.



The client self-select food pantry opened in October, allowing our neighbors to choose food items for their families. 200 families visit our food pantry each week.

After years of maintenance

challenges with our refrigerated truck, we were able to purchase a new refrigerated truck that our drivers say is like going from "driving a horse and buggy to a Mercedes." Our plan is to expand our food reach in 2025 to remote areas in Fremont County that do not have access to grocery stores or food pantries.

Stoneham Wright serves as our Warehouse Manager and oversees all of the food programs. This new position ensures that our clients continue to receive excellent service. Thanks to Brent Briggs (Program Director Emergency Shelter) and our emergency shelter residents, we now have a garden! This crew was responsible for designing, building, planting, watering and harvesting. Fresh produce was used in meals served in our emergency shelter and distributed in our food pantry. Plans are already underway to expand our garden in 2025.



A new Street Outreach program was created this year. Yvette Sheets (Street Outreach Coordinator) and Tomi Jordan (Street Outreach Peer Support) are the dynamic duo who help recruit and train new outreach volunteers. Through their efforts, street outreach is now conducted 5 days a week. The team works closely with law enforcement, provides assistance to downtown businesses and helps those who are living on the streets connect to local resources.

Our emergency shelter also received a much needed case manager to help our shelter residents navigate next steps as they transition out of homelessness. Our emergency shelter provides temporary shelter for 38 individuals and having a full-time case manager helps to ensure our residents receive sufficient support. Diane Nelson (Case Manager) assists residents with getting their Colorado Identification Cards, Social Security Cards and other important documents. She also helps connect them to medical providers and other community organizations.

An \$80,000 grant from UnbridledACTS served as the capstone to our 40th anniversary.

Funds will be used to help with the construction costs of our new warehouse.

Reduction in Homelessness

For the past 5 years our community has been very deliberate in reducing the number of individuals who are homeless in our service area. Several taskforces and forums have been established that focus on the various challenges around homelessness.

Some of the taskforces and forums include:

- Monthly Fremont County Homeless Coalition meetings
- Weekly housing meetings for individuals who are homeless and have a housing resource
- Bi-weekly case conferencing for the chronically homeless
- Bi-monthly solution focused discussion to reduce homelessness
- Quarterly meetings with CCPD focusing on the top 12 high utilizers
- Monthly street outreach meeting

On January 1st, 2024, our county had 208 individuals who were homeless. Throughout the year, an additional 122 individuals became homeless, resulting in 330 individuals who experienced homelessness in 2024.



Our community's homeless response system was able to identify and quickly connect people experiencing homelessness with housing and provide services when needed. By the end of 2024, the number of individuals who were homeless dropped to 115, resulting in a 65% reduction in homelessness.

This remarkable achievement is the direct result of the amazing community collaboration that exists with over 20 community partners. Partners include law enforcement agencies, local government, community service providers, mental health and medical providers, government agencies, churches, landlords, and many concerned citizens. Our community will continue to collaborate until all our neighbors have a safe place to call home.

Services Provided

Chayah House Emergency Shelter - provides a safe place for men, women and children to sleep. Case management supports are provided to help our guests connect to community resources, employment and housing. Hot meals, showers, and laundry facilities are also available. Open every day from 4pm - 8am.

Homelessness Prevention Financial Assistance – provides limited financial assistance for rent and utilities to help families and individuals avoid homelessness.

Street Outreach – builds relationships with people experiencing homelessness who may be disconnected and alienated not only from mainstream services and supports, but from the services targeting homeless persons.

Food Pantry – no one should go hungry in our community. Our client-choice food pantry and mobile food pantry are open to all. Additional food support is available to low-income senior citizens.

Work and Gain Employment and Education Services (WAGEES) - strives for a nonjudgmental holistic approach to individuals recently released from prison. Our WAGEES program is not just about getting a job to survive, it's about building confidence and skills to thrive.

New Creations Inn (NCI) Transitional Housing- offers a fresh start to single adults who are seeking a Christ-centered safe, supportive, structured and sober-living environment.

Restoring Hope Supportive Housing - assists families and individuals who are experiencing homelessness transition into permanent housing and reach self-sufficiency. Various housing resources are available that include short-term and long-term rental assistance. Ongoing case management supports are provided.

Journey Home Supportive Housing – offers supportive housing to individuals and families experiencing homelessness. Comprehensive services and a thriving community provide the foundation tenants need to connect with local resources designed to move them to healthier, more productive lives. Empowering tenants to secure employment and/or education is a cornerstone of the Journey Home program.

Who we are

The vision for Loaves & Fishes Ministries of Fremont County began with our local pastors as they desired a more holistic way to help neighbors in need. Since 1984, we have been serving people who are experiencing homelessness and poverty by providing essential services and lifechanging programs.

From the beginning, our foundation has been grounded in the Gospel of Christ. Our goal is not for individuals to become dependent on us or the programs we offer, but instead to find freedom in Christ that will lead to a restoration with God, their families and their communities.

Our Core Values

Holistic approach— We believe in a holistic approach that deals with the spiritual, physical, relational and economic brokenness faced by those we serve. Our hope is to make a lasting difference in Fremont County by affecting change in all of these areas.

Origin in Dignity—We believe that all people have inherited dignity by being created in the image of God and thus have an innate right to be valued, respected and to receive ethical treatment.

Partnerships—We believe that partnerships with other nonprofits, local businesses, government agencies and faith based communities are essential as we seek solutions for our community. In addition, these relationships extend to those who are touched through this ministry as we strive towards a cooperative attitude in every interaction.

Empowerment—We believe in empowerment instead of handouts, where solutions are lasting and transferable. This method of ministry requires patience and perseverance, but this approach leads to healthier families and ultimately a stronger community.
